The adventures of a Syderstone Donkey

Taken from The Norfolk Chronicle 20th July 1850

In Victorian times the main way of getting the news was from newspapers. Like social media today they often had stories that were funny or interesting. This is one of these.

Robert Daw from Syderstone had a small donkey. In 1832 this donkey was stolen. Luckily the thief was discovered and the donkey was returned. Seventeen years later the donkey was stolen again. This time it was taken all the way to Norwich, where the thief sold it to an unsuspecting person from the Norfolk Broads. He tied the donkey to his horse and cart and set off home. Unfortunately the donkey got tangled up and was knocked unconscious by the cart. The poor donkey looked dead so the man left it at the road side. Later that night a policeman came along the road and thought the dark lump was a drunken man. Looking closer with his lantern he saw it was a donkey and as it started to recover he took it to the local stray animal pound. Nobody claimed the donkey, and after a few days it was sold to a new owner. It was just being led away when another policeman saw it and recognised it as the donkey stolen from Syderstone. The donkey was then led back to Syderstone. Here his old owner Mr Daw and half of the village turned out “..to welcome their ancient friend on his return to his native common”.

It is to be hoped that after all his adventures the donkey then lived happily ever after.

Remembering a Syderstone resident – front cover story

If you've walked down Mill Lane in the last month or so, you might have noticed a brand new wooden bench on the green at the corner of Norman Way. Look closely and you'll see it is dedicated to a David Powley who lived in the village for many years.

David was a much loved Dad to Vicki Harper and although it is 22 years since he passed, she wanted to commemorate his life in the special place he loved and called home.

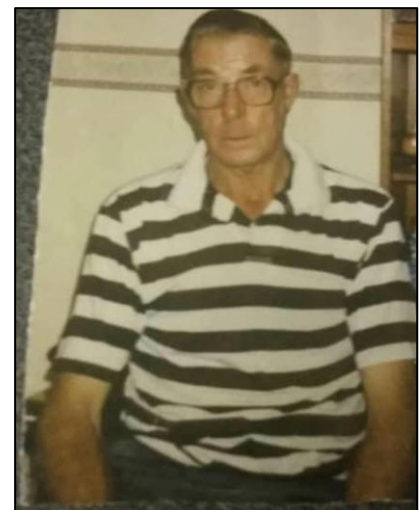


Vicki takes up the story: Dad lived in Syderstone for 47 years, first at Ten Cottages then on Tattersett Road. He moved here when he was 17 to work on Whitehall Farm. He worked there until he was 63 years old.

I wanted to honour Dad's memory in the village as I'm the only family member still living here. I was born in Syderstone and I've lived here all my life. I wanted a piece of my Dad in the village which was such a special place to him; somewhere I can go to still feel close to him as well as for his friends who are still in the village to remember him by. The corner of Mill Lane and Norman Way was chosen as the tree there is dedicated to Jimmy Cable who was his neighbour in Ten Cottages as well as his work mate at the farm for many years. Jimmy took him under his wing and looked after him so it felt right to have the bench next to his tree so he can still look after him now!

Dad was part of Syderstone football team for a few years and the Syderstone darts team. As a family we used to attend the dances in the Old Tin Hut or as it's properly known, the Ex Serviceman's Institute, which used to be near the village pub.

Dad would stop and talk to everyone when we were out walking on the Common and through the village. A walk with my Dad which should have normally been 30 - 40 minutes sometimes seemed like hours!! Everyone knew David Powley he was known by many in the village as a true gentleman which he most certainly was! But to me he was just 'My Dad'.

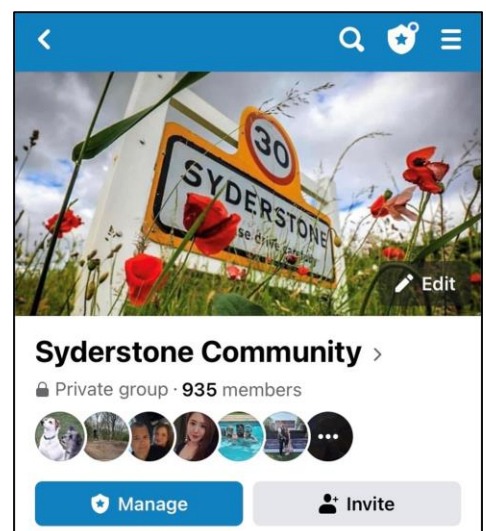

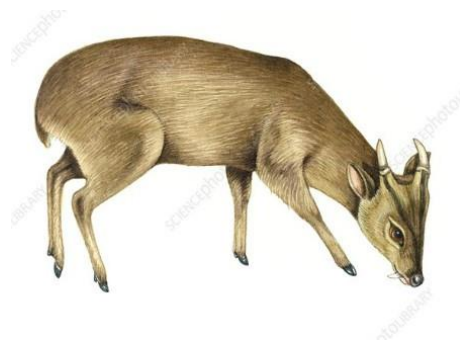
NATURALLY SYDERSTONE - Sounding off

The nearly-dog is at it again. Bark! Bark! Bark! We can hear it all over the village and I daresay South Creake is listening in too. But listen again. That sound is not quite canine – a little more gravelly, more hoarse. So what is it?

The sound belongs to Britain's smallest deer, and it's no surprise that the muntjac's other name is 'barking deer'. Why does a muntjac bark? Many of the reasons are tied up with sex (aren't they always), especially when the doe is in oestrus. Since this deer is native to the dense forests of south-east Asia, they may simply be letting rivals and potential mates know where they are in a place where sound is more important than sight. Those calls are also thought, in certain circumstances, to be an anxiety thing. If a deer is bothered by something unfamiliar, it'll set off that bark routine. And it can go on for a long, long time, a regular shout for maybe 40 minutes or so at a time. The secret behind the muntjac's impressive though tedious stamina may rest down its throat – one theory has it that the muntjac produces plentiful mucus to lubricate its vocal cords.

The good news is that the muntjac barks most during the breeding season. The bad news is that the breeding season lasts all year round – does can give birth in every calendar month. We just have to get used to it.

Perhaps thankfully its bark is a secondary means by which these normally solitary animals communicate. Their primary scent glands are on the face and forehead and they rub their heads on trees to leave a smelly message for other passing deer about their age, sex, condition and health. It's a silent bark on bark.
