An update from Dawn Niemann, Chair of Syderstone Parish Council

The planters at the new village gates in Tattersett Road have now been installed. Drought-tolerant plants have been planted, but most won't flower until next year. The three other sets are looking good too—thank you to everyone who has taken a moment to comment on them.

At our July meeting, the Council co-opted Andy Knight to fill the Parish Councillor vacancy. We look forward to welcoming him to his first meeting in September, and we thank the other applicants for their interest.



We're pleased to share that the Parish Council has recently secured £5,000 from the Jack's Lane Community Benefit Fund towards replacing the much-loved birds nest swing at the village play area. This popular piece of equipment has been enjoyed by children for many years, and the new replacement will ensure it can continue to provide safe fun for years to come. Work on the replacement will begin soon, and we look forward to welcoming families back to enjoy it.

One of the Parish Council's SAM2 speed awareness signs has developed a fault requiring significant repair. Given the age of the unit, and with an opportunity to apply for 50% funding through the Norfolk County Council Parish Partnership Scheme, the Council will be submitting a bid for a brand-new sign. If successful, the new SAM2 will help the parish continue monitoring traffic speeds and promoting road safety. Funding outcomes are expected in March 2026.

Work continues on the Emergency Plan, and the draft should be completed shortly. On the Neighbourhood Plan, the legal examiner is still in the process of reviewing the proposed plan. Once the examiner has completed their assessment and shared their findings, the proposal will move forward to a public referendum, giving residents the opportunity to have their say.

We have received a number of complaints about parking—particularly vehicles parked half on pavements and close to junctions or driveways.

This has caused problems for visibility when exiting junctions and for those using buggies or mobility aids who need access to dropped kerbs. On some occasions, cars parked on both sides of the road have made it difficult for wider vehicles, such as fire engines, to get through. Please take a moment to check that your car is parked safely and with consideration for others.

With autumn on the way, now is a good time to check any hedges or shrubs that border the pavement outside your home. Please make sure there's enough space for everyone to pass comfortably—whether they're walking, using a buggy, or getting around with a mobility aid. A quick trim can make all the difference, helping to keep our pavements safe and easy to use for all members of the community. Thank you for taking the time to help keep our village paths clear and welcoming.

A big thank you goes to Ian Walker, who responded to our call for help and gave the bench near the village hall some much-needed TLC.



SYDERSTONE LOCAL HISTORY GROUP - Syderstone to Botany Bay

In the village archives, Sheila Riches has collected articles from old newspapers that involve Syderstone. Several of these are about crime in the village, and this story concerns one robbery.

At the start of the 1800s there were over 220 crimes that carried the death penalty, including the theft of goods valued above 5 shillings (25p). An article dated 2nd May 1835 states that James Chilvers had been charged with entering the house of Mark Doughty of Syderstone and stealing "a silk shawl, two pairs of stockings, and other articles ..". He was remanded on charges of house-breaking.

His trial took place in August 1835. He was convicted and sentenced to death. Fortunately for James Chilvers, his sentence was subsequently reduced to transportation for life to Australia.

James was now held, waiting for a prison ship to take him to Australia. He was probably kept on a prison hulk. These were old ships which were anchored along the coast, as featured in *Great Expectations* by Charles Dickens. The convicts consisted of men, women and children, and were often kept in very grim conditions.

James was waiting for 10 months. Then, on May 5th 1836, he was loaded along with 398 other convicts onto the prison ship *Moffatt*. The journey to New South Wales took 118 days. Groups of convicts would be kept in locked cells deep within the ship, with only short periods of exercise in the open air.

He arrived in Australia on August 31st, and there his records cease. Between 1788 and 1868 some 162,000 convicts were transported in prison ships to Australia. They were required to construct public buildings, build roads, clear the land for farms and do farm work. It was a brutal life. The prisoners were guarded by soldiers, and breaking the rules was often punished with the lash.

Did he survive or even prosper, or like many others did he fail to keep going? We may never know. But think of James when you next hear a song about being bound for Botany Bay.

NATURALLY SYDERSTONE - Colour up

Over the next few weeks we'll start to see around the village that extraordinary natural phenomenon when tree leaves change their colours, a traffic light system from green, through amber to red, as if life is shifting for the winter from go to stop. And this year – of all years – promises to be a full spectrum autumn.

Where do those colours come from? It's not as if the tree can drum up trendy "Syderstone Gold" from Farrow & Ball paint stores. One of the many astonishing facts is that the tree leaf has an in-built palette. Those dazzling yellows and oranges are there already. In the spring, the tree is pumping green chlorophyll into its leaves. The chlorophyll absorbs yellow and blue light to help it photosynthesize, but does not use green, which is reflected back and that's why the leaves look green.

Now that autumn is creeping in, there's increasingly less light and the tree senses that change. Ash trees decide the game's up and are first to drop their leaves while still green. Most species go into chemical reverse, breaking down chlorophyll, drawing those energy sugars out of the leaves and back into its trunk to store them for the winter. It is now that other previously suppressed pigments come to the fore. Carotenoids give oaks, birches, maples, limes, willows and beech their brilliant yellows. Nearly all trees of European origin show that green-yellow pattern.

What about red? Nearly all of the trees showing this colour, such as exotic maples, cherry and plum trees originate from North America or



Asia. At the onset of autumn they produce a new pigment, anthocyanin, which generates that colour. And in drought-stressed years like this one, some native species (especially rowans) do so too.

Take a walk and enjoy the light show.
