Syderstone lies approximately 10 miles from the North Norfolk coast and is 7.5 miles from the market town of Fakenham. On its south side stretches the extensive common spanning roughly 4 miles and is a haven for wildlife including the rare Natterjack Toad.

The historic round towered parish church of St. Mary's dates back to the Norman era and is mentioned in the Domesday book.

The village hall is named after Amy Robsart. In 1549 she married Robert Dudley, the Earl of Leicester and her sudden death in 1560 led to suspicion that she may have been murdered by her husband thus freeing him to potentially marry Elizabeth I. Sir Walter Scott's novel 'Kenilworth' was later based on this suspicion.

Syderstone is situated close to the picturesque villages of North and South Creake and the popular town of Burnham Market lies a little further away towards the beautiful North Norfolk Coast.

## Syderstone marks the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day

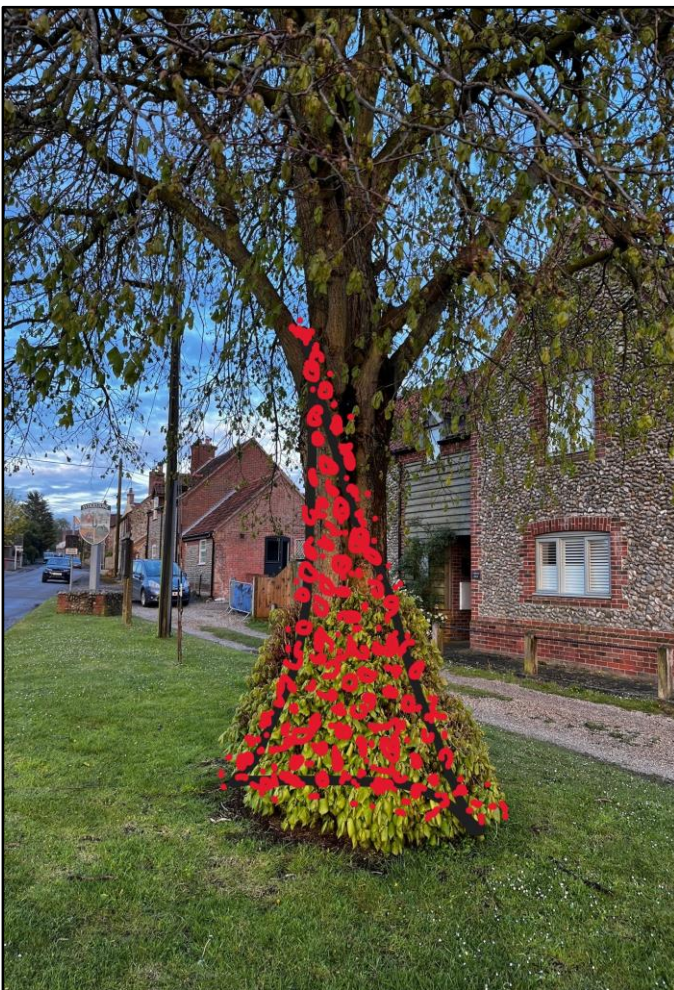
The Syderstone Beacon will burn bright in the evening skies again on Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> June to commemorate the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day. The beacon was first erected on the playing field by Syderstone Parish Council for the Platinum Jubilee celebrations in June 2022.



In recognition of their contribution to the village over the last 18 years, it will be lit by Sheila and Norman Riches at 9.15pm and will be part of a nationwide chain of beacons across the UK.

## Syderstone Community Arts and Crafts Group

We currently have 30 members from a wide area across North West Norfolk. 18 live in the Syderstone/Wicken Green/Blenheim Park area, others from further afield such as Swaffham, Fakenham, Helhoughton, Colkirk, Great Ryburgh, Brisley and Sculthorpe.

The range of projects people bring along includes knitting, crochet, painting, decoupage, felting, embroidery, card making, mindful colouring and sewing. This year we have been running 'learning workshops' - optional 'add-on' sessions which run alongside the usual group activities; an opportunity for members to learn new crafts, mainly from other members, who share their learning and expertise freely and at no cost. These sessions build not only new skills but new friendships and new confidence in both the learners and the skills-sharers. So far, we have run crochet, card-making and glass coaster-making workshops. We have a felt animals workshop coming up later this month.

Whilst we are first and foremost an arts and crafts group, for many of our members this group is much more than that. It's also where we meet old friends, make new ones and learn new skills. **...from Dawn Niemann, Chair of Syderstone Parish Council**

Thank you to everyone who contributed their views in the recent survey that was part of the consultation for the Syderstone Neighbourhood Plan. This will become a key planning document produced by the parish council to influence the future type and location of new development in the parish. A Neighbourhood Plan is a way of recording the preferences and wishes of our village community in a way that should help to protect and improve it - our way of having a say in the future of our village. It will be an important document which will sit alongside the King's Lynn and West Norfolk Borough Council Local Plan. It will represent the views and aspirations of our community and can be referred to regarding local issues that are not covered by the Borough's plan.

## Syderstone Neighbourhood Plan

Syderstone Parish Council is in the process of developing a neighbourhood plan. A Neighbourhood Plan is a community-led plan and gives residents an opportunity to have a say in how the village develops, ensuring future development aligns with community needs. It can protect valued assets and influence the type, design and location of developments whilst promoting sustainable growth.

We are currently in the early stages of preparing this plan and have just undertaken our first initial consultation to gather community views. A total of 95 people answered the surveys. Key topics are summarised on the following pages.

## **NEXT STEPS**

The parish council/steering group are now starting to draft a neighbourhood plan as well as its supporting documents. The plan will take into consideration the views shared within the initial survey including topics around housing, design, employment, and the historic and natural environment.

## Design and Housing

- Most respondents (81 people) think the neighbourhood plan should include design guidelines for new development.
- Numerous respondents (67 people) think new housing should be environmentally sustainable. However, many stated as long as this doesn't lead to developments being unaffordable to local people.
- Most respondents (88 people) think the neighbourhood should provide guidance on the size and type of new homes built in the parish.
- If new homes were built in the parish many said they want more family homes, first homes and affordable homes. 71 people did not want to see any more holiday accommodation.
- The style of new homes respondents would like to see were more semi-detached (64 people) followed by bungalows (38 people). 59 people did not want to see any apartments/flats.
- If new homes were built in the parish many said the size of these should be 2-3 beds (70 people). 54 people would rather not see more 5+ beds.



## Natural/Historic Environment

- Most respondents (83 people) agreed it is important to protect existing habitats.
- Most respondents (84 people) would support the identification of wildlife corridors.
- 62 people supported the idea of protecting green spaces such as the allotment, common, recreation field and Womack Woods.
- 51 people put forward ideas to protect locally important views looking within the village and beyond.
- Most respondents (93 people) said that heritage is important with 55 people listing specific buildings.

## Transport/Access

- Many respondents wished to see improvements to footpaths and access to services (70+ people).

## Community Facilities/Employment

- Facilities suggested for protection included the allotments, recreation field and village hall.
- 47 people suggested ideas they would like to see in the village such as a shop, pub, and more leisure activities.
- Over half of the respondents are in employment with many working outside of the parish.

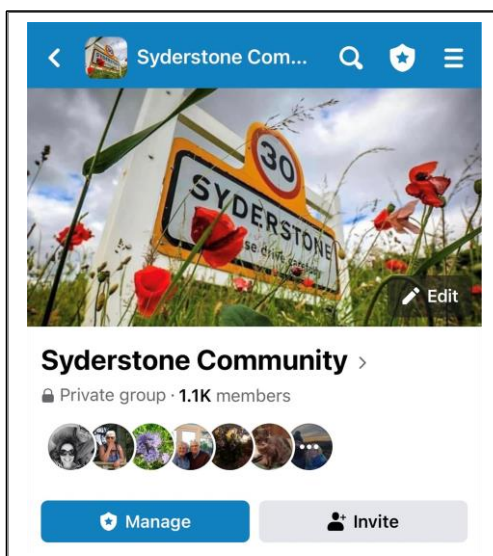
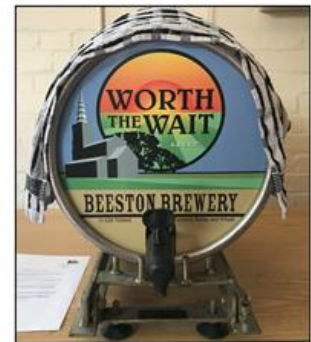

## NATURALLY SYDERSTONE

### FLOWERS OF THE HEART

Great spires of foxgloves are rising on the Common and in many of the village's gardens this month, but did you know that this plant played a pivotal role in modern medicine?

Big-bodied bumblebees somehow squeeze into the pretty flowers, looking like strings of bells on a stalk. The sweet nectar can do the insects nothing but good. For humans, the foxglove has a dangerous duality.



Early herbalists needed to handle the foxglove with care. Its leaves were infused to treat sore throats and catarrh; they were also used as a compress for swellings, bruises, and ulcers. But they were most effective in treating fluid retention (then called dropsy, now oedemas). Sometimes too effective – a dose too big would kill the patient.

Botanist-physician William Withering carried out research on this problematic plant and in 1785 published his findings in a seminal book called *An Account of the Foxglove*. Not only did Withering discover that dried foxglove leaves (called digitalis) contained substances that slowed the heart, he also concluded that an excess quantity would stop it altogether. Withering's work laid the foundation for proper, quantified prescribing of drugs as a medical discipline.

As for the foxglove, its leaves are still used in treatment today, though long ago we resorted to importing species from the Continent, especially Grecian foxglove. When supplies ran out during blockades in WW2, County Herb Committees put the plant on their lists of things to gather, and often ladies of the WI would be the most assiduous collectors. Were there foxglove pickers in Syderstone, and where were the plants stored? If you have any knowledge, please do contact the editor.

As for the charming name, the flower is meant to resemble a glove and it grew in places where you would find foxes. Or so they say!
